

CHAPTER IX

COMPARATIVE RARITIES

THE PREVIOUS chapters have recorded and described all the games known at the present time. This publication may be the means of stimulating interest in the subject, and will certainly act as a check list to which doubtless many more titles will be added as the years pass.

Respecting values it is admittedly difficult to speak; in and around 1934 the author frequently bought copies of the engraved editions for a few shillings each—15 years later those same copies were fetching between £2 and £5.

To place a value on games of which the author has seen only one copy, e.g. John Jeffery's *Play of Geography*, or others which he has never seen, e.g. Wallis's *Tour of America*, is quite impossible; they must be exceedingly rare.

A copy of *The Eventful Career of Napoleon Buonaparte* is in the Hull Municipal Galleries; the author knows of none other.

John Speed's *Middlesex*, with plans of London and Westminster and views of St. Paul's and Westminster Abbey (1610), sold for 20 guineas in 1946.

John Rocque's *London and The Country Round* was published in 1746 (about the time of *Goose*), and maps taken from it sell to-day for about 5 guineas each.

Condition surely must have influenced prices; *Destruction of Jerusalem* is infinitely rarer than Wallis's *Tour of England & Wales*. So also is *Life of Moses*.

Demand, too, is a factor; *Human Life*, for example, at 1,250 francs is not so rare as Darton's *Tour Through Scotland* at a tenth of its price, but for attractiveness the former is in a class of its own.

These old games are indeed works of art, and their collection provides a most fascinating occupation.

CHAPTER X

JIG-SAW PUZZLES

ALTHOUGH NOT games in the strict sense of the word, and more accurately described as "Dissected Puzzles", under which name they are referred to in the old mapsellers' price lists, and who must have sold them in large numbers in the early days of the nineteenth century, reference to them may not be out of place.

John Wallis in his catalogue of 1813 (see page 76) offers such puzzles at prices ranging from one and sixpence to a guinea.

The early ones were engravings pasted on to mahogany or cedar wood $\frac{1}{8}$ in. thick and cut with a silversmith's saw (fretsaw blades not then having been invented), and it being a matter of some difficulty to turn the saw accurately in a small circle, the minimum number of interlocks or dovetails was employed, most of the puzzle having dissected pieces rather than the interlocking ones of the present day.

A cedar or polished sycamore wood box usually housed the puzzle, its sliding lid often carrying an engraved label describing the contents.

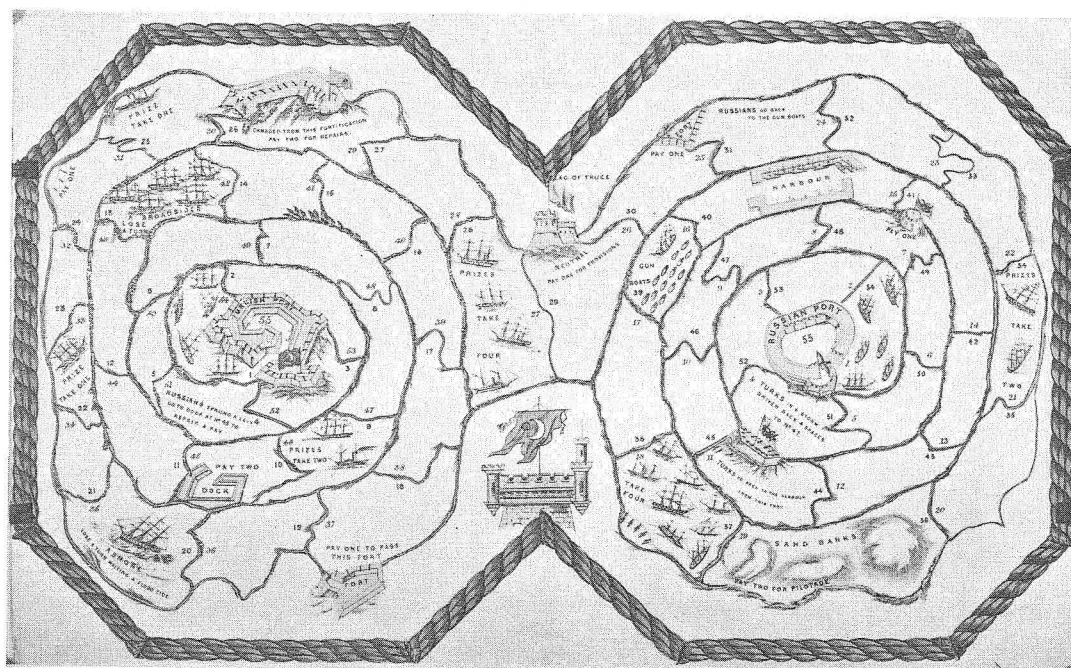
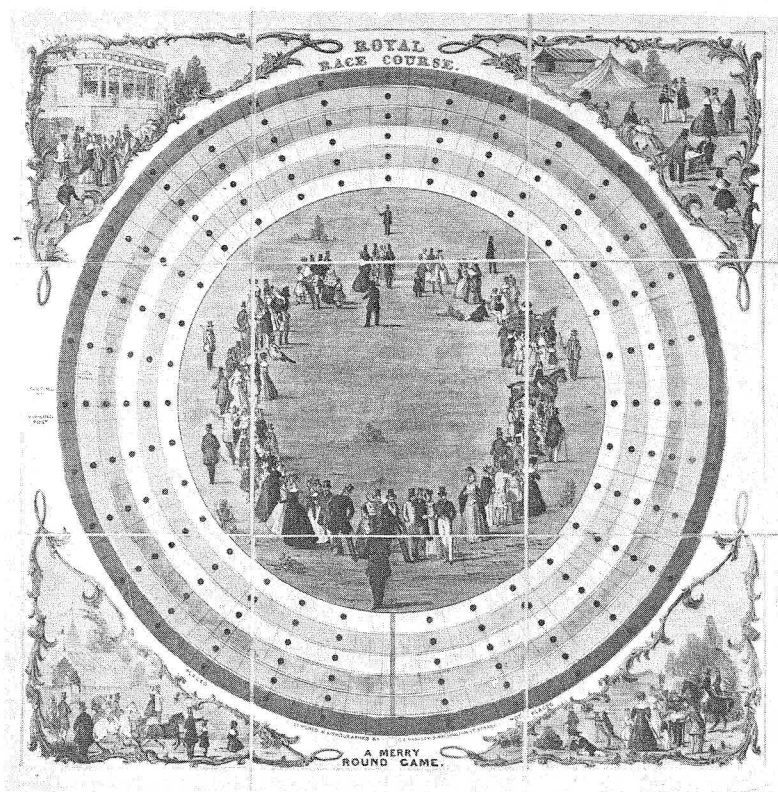
The variety of these puzzles was very great; religious subjects and maps were probably the most popular, and a brief description of three of them, made in the ten years between 1799 and 1809, will suffice:

CHRONOLOGICAL TABLES OF ENGLISH HISTORY FOR THE INSTRUCTION OF YOUTH (40)

*Published as the Act Directs April 10th 1799 by John Wallis at his
Map Warehouse Ludgate Street. London.*

An engraving size 24 in \times 16 in showing the monarchs of 32 reigns from William the Conqueror to George II in ovals, all hand-coloured. The dates of their birth, accession and death are given. Remarkable events and eminent persons in each reign are recorded—of Charles II

it says "Charles was Able and Profligate: He never said a foolish thing nor ever did a wise one". N.B. This was a printed opinion only just over 100 years after his death.

In this puzzle the lines along which the cuts were to be made are engraved on the plate, and have been followed with extreme accuracy: this is a most uncommon feature; usually the puzzles were cut free hand.

When all the pieces had been mixed up, they could be reassembled only in the correct positions, which also was the correct sequence of monarchs. Each monarch and the details of his reign form one puzzle piece measuring about $3 \text{ in} \times 2\frac{1}{4} \text{ in}$.

Only eight interlocks or dovetails are used, all of them in the border pieces to hold the framework of the puzzle together, the central portion being cut in wavy lines, i.e. dissected.

(This puzzle hangs framed in the Chad Valley Company's Board Room at Harborne, Birmingham.)

EUROPE DISSECTED FOR THE INSTRUCTION OF YOUTH IN GEOGRAPHY

Undated and without Publisher's name, but almost certainly by John Wallis.

The puzzle is composed of a part map of Europe, having straight edges at top, bottom and left hand lower corner; the other edges are cut in a sweeping line to remove "Asia".

Mounted on cedar wood $\frac{1}{8}$ in thick, most of the countries are cut along their national borders and left in one piece, but Russia, being so large, has a straight cut through the centre. Six interlocks are employed.

This puzzle is uncoloured except for a tinted line around each country.

The box is mahogany with slide lid, having an oval label on the top bearing the name of the puzzle.

The price of 3s. 6d. in the caligraphy of that age appears on the dotted lines provided for that purpose.

THE HILL OF SCIENCE—AN ALLEGORY

An engraving, beautifully hand-coloured, size 8 in \times 14 in. The picture shows at the base "The Barren Land of Ignorance"—passing through the Gate of Languages, and leaving behind "The Gulf of Oblivion", the path of virtue leads to the summit where stands "The Temple of Truth".

The picture mounted on to cedar wood has been cut into about fifty pieces, following the outlines of the gate, path, etc.

The complete puzzle is contained in a wooden box with slide lid with picture label on top.

Published 29th September, 1807 by John Wallis Snr., 13 Warwick Square, and John Wallis Junr., 188 Strand, London.
